

Meal Prices:

Dinner on Thursday, April 7th and lunch and dinner on April 8th are included in your registration fee. If you stay at the Marriott Thursday night, a breakfast bag will be provided to you at check-in for Friday morning.

1.0 Participation in the Japan Bowl - Who is Eligible?

The National Japan Bowl is open to full-time students who are currently enrolled in Levels II, III, and IV Japanese language classes at a high school in the United States, whether in regular or block schedule classes.

The national championship teams from Mexico and Canada may also join the National Japan Bowl, provided they meet the same eligibility criteria as US teams and students.

1.1 Levels

The three levels at the National Japan Bowl are:

Level II	Students enrolled in second year high school-level Japanese language study
Level III	Students enrolled in third year high school-level Japanese language study
Level IV	Students enrolled in fourth year high school-level Japanese language study or in AP Japanese

These levels are based on the course level, and not the number of years that a student has studied Japanese in high school. For example, a high school sophomore who began Japanese language study in elementary or junior high school might be studying with high school seniors in Level IV and therefore would be eligible for the Level IV team. However, that student could not participate as a member of a Level II or Level III team, because that is below his/her current level of study. The student's teacher must certify that the student is competing at the proper level.

1.2 Forming a Team

- a. Each school may send only one team per level to the National Japan Bowl. Local and global Japan Bowls may set their own limits for the number of teams per level, per school.
- b. All team members must be studying Japanese formally at the same high school for academic credit, and not as an extracurricular activity.

If Japanese is not offered at a student's high school but a city or county school district offers Japanese classes for academic credit in which students from multiple schools enroll together, whether online or in person, the school district and teacher may form teams to compete in the National Japan Bowl. In such cases, JASWDC will ask for additional information about the program, and a final decision on eligibility will be made by the Japan Bowl Director and Chair of the Japan Bowl Committee.

c. A team must have two or three students. One student is not a team. JASWDC strongly encourages schools to form a team of three students instead of two.

A Japanese kotowaza says, "Sannin yoreba, Monju no chie / Three people together have the wisdom of Monju." It is the Japanese equivalent of "Two heads are better than one." Monju (or Monju-Bosatsu) is the Japanese Buddhist saint of wisdom, learning, and enlightenment.

1.3 Student Eligibility

In addition to team eligibility, each member of the team must meet certain requirements. The following rules about Japanese language education and experience govern the eligibility of each team member:

a. Students who are native speakers of Japanese or who use Japanese at home are not eligible to compete.

b. Students who have had significant exposure to Japanese language and/or culture outside the high school curriculum are not eligible to compete. The determination whether a student's outside exposure is significant will be made on a case-by-case basis, according to the information the student and teacher provide.

For example, students who have spent a cumulative total of three months or more in Japan for language study or a home-stay, including with relatives, might not be eligible to compete. The eligibility of students who have lived in Japan on US military bases or who have studied at international schools in Japan will be determined on a case-by-case basis, based on each student's circumstances.

c. Participation is permitted at a level higher than the student's current high school level of Japanese study, but is not permitted at any level lower than his/her current level.

d. If a student participates in the Japan Bowl at a level higher than the one at which he/she is currently enrolled, that student will not be eligible to compete in a future Japan Bowl at the same or a lower level.

e. Students taking the AP Japanese course are eligible to compete at Level IV.

f. As noted in Section 2.1, the student's teacher must certify that the student is competing at the proper level and that the information on the student's registrations is correct to the best of his/her knowledge.

1.4 Chaperones

a. **There must be at least one adult chaperone per school who is 21 years of age or older.** Usually, the students' Japanese language teacher serves as the chaperone, but there is no requirement that the chaperone must be their teacher. Chaperones are required to register, using the online form that will be provided.

- b. Each team may have its own chaperone, or one adult may be the chaperone for all teams from the same school.
- c. Chaperones are responsible for the well-being of their student(s) throughout the time that they are in Washington DC. They must be present with the students at the National Marriott Hotel & Conference Center throughout the duration of the Japan Bowl.
- d. Chaperones should read the terms of the Chaperone Agreement and then sign it. Chaperones also should be familiar with the rules outlined in the National Japan Bowl Code of Conduct (Section 5.3)
- e. At the time of on-site check-in, all chaperones will be asked to present a valid government-issued photo ID such as a driver's license or passport, and they will be asked to again sign the Chaperone Agreement in the presence of a JASWDC staff member.
- f. If a chaperone is not present at registration or if any of the rules about chaperones are not followed, the team will not be able to participate in the competition.

1.5 Official Student Observers

- a. **Any high school student who is learning Japanese is invited to join the competition as an official student observer**, provided space is available. It does not matter whether their school has sent an official team.
- b. Official student observers are welcome to join other students at meals at the Marriott Conference Center, participate in cultural activities, and receive the official National Japan Bowl T-shirt, provided they submit the Official Student Observer registration form and a \$65 fee per person. Both the form and payment must be received by January 31, 2022.
- c. Provided space is available, official student observers may stay at the Marriott Conference Center and share rooms with Japan Bowl participants. Teachers should reserve a room for these students directly through the Marriott Conference Center or they may contact JASWDC to arrange for observers to share rooms with students from other schools by February 18th, 2022.
- d. Official student observers need to sign the National Japan Bowl Code of Conduct and abide by the National Japan Bowl dress code. They also need to submit signed Chaperone Consent Forms.

1.6 About Friends and Family Members

- a. **Family members and friends are invited to join the students at the National Japan Bowl.** Family members and friends who wish to observe the National Japan Bowl must submit a Friends and Family registration form, which is due January 21, 2022.
- b. Friends and family members also are welcome to join the students at meals at the Marriott Hotel & Conference Center, participate in cultural activities, and receive the official National Japan Bowl T-shirt, provided they submit a \$65 fee per person, together with the "Friends and Family" registration form. Both the form and payment must be received by February 11, 2022.

c. Provided space is available at the Marriott Conference Center, friends and family members may apply for rooms, using the same hotel reservations application that will be sent to schools after team approval.

d. The deadline for submitting the hotel reservation form is the same as for team members and chaperones, which is March 15, 2022.

2.0 Applying to the National Japan Bowl

2.1 How to Apply to the National Japan Bowl

In order to streamline and simplify the registration process, registration for the National Japan Bowl is handled digitally using Active Network. All forms, documents, and payments will be processed on this platform. We do not anticipate that physical documents will need to be mailed to the JASWDC office.

If you have any questions about how to register, please do not hesitate to contact us at (202)833-2210 or japanbowl@jaswdc.org so that we can assist you with your registration.

Step 1 - Submit Team Applications

1. The registration link can be found from the Japan Bowl website under “join the 30th National Japan Bowl” at <http://www.japanbowl.org/join-the-30th-national-japan-bowl/>
2. To begin the process, the Teacher/Advisor for each team should register themselves and the levels from their school on Active. Teachers who will be chaperoning the students will need to select “chaperone registration.” If you are a language teacher who will not be chaperoning your school’s team, you can register just the levels of your school’s team and have the chaperone fill out the chaperone registration themselves.
3. An account will be created linked to your email address. This will allow you to log in and look up your information later. Your name, date of birth, and gender will also be asked.
4. Participants & Options will ask you to select the person you are registering. Please select your name for the level registration sessions you have selected (a message will pop up that you have selected multiple sessions at the same time, which you can ignore).
5. In the case that you will be using school funding or grant funding to pay for students’ registration fees, under “Session options” please check the box for “Team registration for schools who are paying for student registration fee,” and select the number of students that you will be paying for on that team. Each level of team registration will have this option, so please indicate the number of students you are paying for on their respective team level registrations.
6. Based on the sessions you have selected you will be asked different mandatory questions. After entering the information, check the boxes that you agree to the National Japan Bowl Code of Conduct, and the Active Agreement and Waiver. Sign your name digitally by either writing or typing in your name.

7. Confirm your registration details on the “Review cart & check out” page. Teachers registering before the early bird deadline of December 23, 2021 can use the coupon code “**CHAPERONE65**” and the fee for the chaperone will be discounted. This coupon only applies to the language teacher from the school. Only one chaperone fee is waived per school for the early bird. For payment options, you can either pay immediately during registration or at a later date. If you will pay later, please select “enroll in payment plan.” Payment must be received before January 21st, 2022.
8. Create a password for your account. You can log in using your email address and account to view your sessions and make any necessary changes.

Step 2 - Submit Individual Applications

1. Student competitors, chaperones, student observers, and friends/family should then go individually to <https://japanbowl.org/30th-national-japan-bowl/> and register themselves. Students should select “Student Registration” and not registration for the level in which they are competing.
2. Students and student observers under the age of 18 must fill out their registration form with their parent or legal guardian. If you and your parent/legal guardian do not have access to the internet, please contact JASWDC at (202)833-2210 so that we can assist you in registering.
3. Students whose schools are using school funding or grants to pay for their registration fees should select “Price for students whose school are paying for them” before clicking “Add.” Students whose parents will be paying for them should select “Price for parents who are paying for child.”
4. Students will fill out their portion of the form. Parents must fill in and sign the primary parent/guardian section. Additional parents/guardians may also be added.
5. For payment options, you can either pay immediately during registration or at a later date. If you will pay later, please select “enroll in payment plan.” Payment must be received before January 21st, 2022.
6. Create a password for your account. You can log in using your email address and account to view your sessions and make any necessary changes.

Step 3 - Pay Fees

1. Each student, chaperone, observer, and applying team needs to pay registration fees, as follows:
 - Student registration fee - \$65 (per person)
 - Chaperone registration fee - \$65 (per person)
 - Observer registration fee - \$65 (per person)
 - Friends/family registration fee - \$65 (per person)
 - Team registration fee - \$65 (per team)

2. For payment options, you can either pay immediately (“pay in full”) during registration or at a later date. If you will pay later, please select “enroll in payment plan,” select “Deposit +1 Payment(s)” under “Choose payment plan,” and then “Pay balance manually” under “Select billing option.” By selecting these options, you will not have to enter any credit card information when registering, and can pay it at a later time. However, please remember that **payment must be received before January 21st, 2022.**
3. If you are only able to pay by check or are unable to pay by credit card, please contact JASWDC at (202)-833-2210 or japanbowl@jaswdc.org in order to discuss an alternative payment method.

Step 4 - Sign and Assemble Required Documents

The following additional supplemental forms must be submitted after the initial registration is processed:

1. Students and student observers must have their parent/guardian sign and submit the parent guardian consent form.
2. Students/student observers must also submit the participation form, which includes the signatures of their teachers and parent/guardian.
3. Teachers and chaperones must submit the chaperone consent form.
4. Teachers must also submit a certificate of insurance (COI) or Statement of Self Insurance.
5. Proof of Covid-19 vaccination.
6. All these forms can be submitted digitally through Active. Please contact JASWDC if you are unable to upload the forms digitally.

2.2 Team Approval and Registration Confirmation

- a. After receipt, JASWDC will screen all online applications to determine each applicant's eligibility and ensure that all team forms are complete. If there are any questions concerning a student's eligibility, JASWDC will contact the Teacher/Advisor.
- b. JASWDC will send an email to any teacher whose team or student applications are in question. All responses to JASWDC questions must be made in writing through email before Friday, January 17, 2022.
- c. JASWDC will accept all qualified teams, provided space is still available in the competition rooms. Teams will be accepted in the order that they submitted their fully-completed application, until the competition room seating limits are reached at each level.
- d. After screening is completed and any questions have been answered, JASWDC will notify teachers by email to confirm their team and student registrations. Information on lodging and transportation will also be sent to the teacher.
- e. If you or your students would like to share a room with participants from other schools, please submit a request via email to JASWDC at japanbowl@jaswdc.org by February 18, 2022. JASWDC cannot guarantee that you will be matched with another school, but we will do our best so that lodging costs can be kept at a minimum. Once we have matched you with another school, you

will be contacted with the lodging fees for your shared room(s). Payment for lodging is due March 15th, 2022.

If you have not received information regarding lodging by February 4, please contact JASWDC immediately.

f. Do NOT make any travel arrangements that cannot be refunded until you receive the confirmation notice from JASWDC.

2.3 Substitution of Students after Team Approval

a. After teams have been notified of their acceptance and registration, substitutions will be permitted only if a student becomes ill or there is some other valid reason.

b. All substitutes must meet the same eligibility requirements. Therefore, the required application forms for the proposed substitute must be submitted to the JASWDC for review.

c. The JASWDC decision whether to accept a substitute is final. If a substitution is not permitted, the team may compete with two students - but not with just one.

d. If a student withdraws and is not replaced, JASWDC will refund the \$65 student registration fee upon request.

e. The JASWDC will not consider applications for student substitutions after Friday, March 15, 2022, except in extreme circumstances.

2.4 Substitution of Chaperone(s) after Team Approval

a. If the team's designated chaperone changes, a new Chaperone Agreement, signed by the new chaperone, and new Chaperone Consent Forms, signed by the parent/guardian of each student, must be submitted.

b. The deadline for chaperone substitutions is Friday, March 15, 2022.

3.0 Travel Information

3.1 Lodging

There are two options for lodging in the greater Washington DC area.

Option 1

Stay at the Marriott Hotel and Conference Center. Room rates for both single and double rooms will be \$119 +tax. Up to four students may stay in a double room and up to 2 may stay in a single. Students may request to share rooms with students from other schools in order to reduce the cost of the hotel reservation. Unless you are requesting to share a room with another school, you must make your reservation directly through the Marriott Hotel and Conference Center.

More information about how to place a hotel room reservation and splitting the price of hotel rooms will become available in January of 2022.

Option 2

You may arrange other accommodations in the Washington DC area. If you stay at another hotel in Washington or in the Maryland or Virginia suburbs, you will have to pay room tax. In addition, you will need to find transportation to the College Park Marriott Hotel & Conference Center. The nearest METRO (subway) stop, at College Park-University of Maryland on the Green Line, is 1.7 miles away and accessible by METRO bus F6.

3.2 Meals

The participation fee includes three meals at the Marriott Hotel & Conference Center: dinner on April 7 and lunch and dinner on April 8. Participants staying at the hotel Thursday night will be provided with a breakfast bag when checking in. If participants, chaperones, and family members come earlier and/or stay later, they may eat at the restaurant inside the hotel, The Common, or at a restaurant in the College Park area. JASWDC will provide a list of recommended restaurants within walking distance of the hotel and the University of Maryland.

3.3 Information about the College Park Marriott Hotel & Conference Center

Located on the University of Maryland campus, the College Park Marriott Hotel & Conference Center is a platinum LEED-certified eco-friendly hotel with over 75,000 square feet of event space including boardrooms, ballrooms, and comfortable boutique rooms. 3.4 Transportation and Access

- For those who drive, there is ample parking at the National Marriott Hotel & Conference Center.
- Those who arrive at Dulles International Airport (IAD), Baltimore-Washington International Airport (BWI), or Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport (DCA) can share a taxi or Super Shuttle to the hotel or take METRO to College Park-UMD Station via the Blue, Silver, and Green Lines. For more information on reaching METRO station from the airport please visit the WMATA website at <https://www.wmata.com/> to plan your trip.
- Those who arrive by AMTRAK at New Carrollton Station can use METRO to travel to the College Park-UMD Station or the F6 metro bus. For more information on how to reach the

UMD Metro Station from New Carrollton Station or Union Station, please visit the WMATA website at <https://www.wmata.com/> to plan your trip.

- The College Park-UMD METRO station is 1.7 miles from the Marriott Hotel & Conference Center. Metrobus runs a bus from the Metro station to the hotel via the C8 bus line bound for White Flint. The hotel is located at the Campus Dr & Presidential Dr stop.
- DC area students will find that there is plenty of room at the Hotel & Conference Center to study, enjoy the planned cultural activities, and meet students from other parts of the country. DC area students therefore are encouraged to maximize their time at the Center.
- Some DC area teams have chosen to stay overnight at the Marriott Hotel & Conference Center to have more time to enjoy the Japan Bowl and meet other teams from around the country.

4.0 Registration

4.1 Registration Procedures on April 7

- a. Registration will take place from 2:00 to 4:30 pm on Thursday, April 7, 2022 in the Lobby of the Marriott Hotel and Conference Center.
- b. Registration will be conducted by school, not by team. Therefore, all team members and chaperones from the school must be together at the time of registration.
- c. All competitors, chaperones, and observers must present COVID-19 vaccination records at time of registration.
- d. The chaperone(s) must present a government-issued photo ID (such as a driver's license or passport) and re-sign the chaperone agreement form at the time of registration.
- e. Participants who will be staying overnight at the hotel on Thursday night will also receive a Grab and Go breakfast bag at checkout to keep for breakfast the next morning.

5.0 Rules of Conduct

5.1 National Japan Bowl Code of Conduct

To provide a safe, secure environment for all its guests, the Japan-America Society of Washington DC requires that all Japan Bowl participants adhere to the National Japan Bowl Code of Conduct.

Adult chaperones and group leaders are responsible for enforcing this Code. These rules are not subject to interpretation, and each group is expected to follow them without exception or risk dismissal from the National Japan Bowl Competition.

Dress Code

- All participants are expected to dress in Business Attire with formal, close-toed shoes for the first day of the competition and in their official National Japan Bowl t-shirt on the second day of the competition. Team members who are not dressed appropriately may be asked to leave the competition room.
- No jeans, shorts, T-shirts (except for the official 2022 National Japan Bowl T-shirt), tank tops, caps, hats or head coverings (except for religious wear), athletic attire or sneakers, leggings, miniskirts, bare midriffs, or flip-flops are permitted during the competition (preliminary, conversation, and championship rounds).

Japan Bowl Lanyards

- All Japan Bowl participants are expected to wear their official Japan Bowl lanyards throughout the competition and their time at the Marriott Hotel and Conference Center. Lanyards will be required to attend preliminary rounds, culture workshops, and other Japan Bowl networking events. Any participant without a lanyard may be denied entry to a round of the Japan Bowl competition.

Technology Use

- The use of any technology during competition rounds of the Japan Bowl competition is strictly prohibited. This includes but is not strictly limited to calculators, cell phones of any kind, laptops, electronic tablets, and watches of any kind. Students, chaperones, and observers are prohibited from photographing or otherwise documenting rounds of the competition, including the answer review. Any student that needs to use a laptop or other electronic device in order to compete must obtain written consent from the National Japan Bowl prior to the competition.

Cheating and Academic Dishonesty

- In order to ensure a fair competition environment, regardless of competition format (in-person or virtual), all Japan Bowl participants are prohibited from the use of any material that may give them an unfair advantage over any other participants during the competition. Students may not use textbooks, study guides, handwritten notes, online resources, cell phones, tablets, or smart watches during the preliminary, conversation or championship rounds. Students are of course encouraged to study outside of the competition rounds but sharing of answers with those outside of the competition or copying, screenshotting, photographing, or recording any parts of the preliminary rounds of the competition is strictly prohibited.

Curfew

- In order to maintain a safe environment for our participants, the National Japan Bowl enforces a curfew policy for those students staying overnight. Students may not use common areas between 11 pm and 6 am during the days of the competition. Teachers and chaperones are within their rights to impose earlier curfews for their students, but the National Japan Bowl will never enforce a curfew other than this competition-wide curfew.

Alcohol and Controlled Substances

- Possession or use of alcoholic beverages or controlled substances is strictly prohibited while participating in the competition. Students found in violation of this

policy during the competition may be dismissed from the competition. In addition, public intoxication of minors is illegal in the State of Maryland and is punishable by law.

Assault, Harassment, and Discrimination

- Any participant found to have assaulted or harassed a competitor, chaperone, observer, member of JASWDC staff, conference center guest, or member of the Marriott staff will be dismissed from the competition. Misconduct of any kind will be reported in accordance with Maryland State Laws and University of Maryland policy.

Covid-19 Guidelines

- All participants in the National Japan Bowl competition must submit a valid immunization record for COVID-19 prior to their arrival at the competition. Immunization records must be submitted in English and show completed immunization with a CDC approved vaccine. For more information on the accepted vaccines visit the CDC website at: <https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/covid-19/index.html>. This includes family and friends, observers, and teachers who wish to attend the competition. Those wishing to apply for an exemption from this policy must email the National Japan Bowl at japanbowl@jaswdc.org.
- **All participants in the Japan Bowl competition will be expected to comply with Prince George's County and University of Maryland's official campus masking policies regardless of vaccination status.** The University mandates that all visitors wear a mask when participating in any activities involving K-12 students. Masks must be worn at all times while inside any building on the University of Maryland campus, including the Marriott Hotel and Conference Center. Participants are allowed to remove their masks in their hotel rooms and briefly while eating. Any competitor, chaperone, or observer found in violation of masking guidelines may be dismissed from the competition.

JASWDC has the sole right to determine, in its own judgment, whether any action requires disqualification. Students may be disqualified for violating any of the policies outlined in the National Japan Bowl Code of Conduct or any policies set forth by the Marriott Hotel and Conference Center.

5.2 Grounds for Disqualification

Following are the possible grounds for the disqualification of a student or team from the competition. JASWDC has the sole right to determine, in its own judgment, whether any action requires disqualification.

- a. Challenging or showing lack of respect to National Japan Bowl officials, staff, or volunteers by a student, teacher, or chaperone
- b. Inappropriate dress (see Section 5.1)
- c. Use of offensive language
- d. Substantial violation of the rules of the Marriott Hotel & Conference Center
- e. Misrepresentations and/or other irregularities on an application form which become apparent at the time of registration or during the competition.

f. Violation of the National Japan Bowl rules about photographic equipment and electronic devices, including watches, that are capable of recording, photographing, or transmitting.

g. Making the questions or answers known to others via any kind of communications network, including email and social media.

Depending on the severity of the infringement, the JASWDC may prohibit the student(s) and possibly the entire team or school from participating in the National Japan Bowl at any Level in the following year. We therefore ask students, parents/guardians, and teachers to encourage appropriate behavior, to ensure that there are no misunderstandings.
